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Crocheted Yokes and Gatting



Series No. 4

Chain (ch). The chain stitch is the beginning of all crochet work. Make a loop of thread and with the hook draw the thread through the loop, which forms a stitch.



Slip stitch (sl st) is used to join rows together. After the foundation ch is made, insert the hook in stitch and draw thread through loop and stitch at same time.



Single crochet (s c). Draw a loop through a stitch of the foundation, thread over the hook, and draw through both loops on the hook at the same time.



Double crochet (d c). Thread over hook, take up a loop through a stitch of the foundation; thread over hook again and draw through two loops, thread over hook again and draw through two remaining loops.



Treble crochet (tr c). This stitch is made the same as double crochet, except that the thread is passed over the hook three times, drawing through two stitches each time, as before.



Picot (p). Make a chain of three or more stitches, pass hook through first chain made, and work a single crochet.



Space (sp) used in Filet Crochet. Chain 2 stitches, skip 2, 1 d c in next stitch, ch 2, skip 2, 1 d c in next, ch 5 at end of turn.



Group (gp). A group is composed of 4 d c. 1 d c over d c, 2 d c in sp, 1 d c over d c. If the row starts with a group or groups, make 3 ch to turn. If the row starts with space, make 5 ch to turn.

* Means that the directions between stars are to be repeated.

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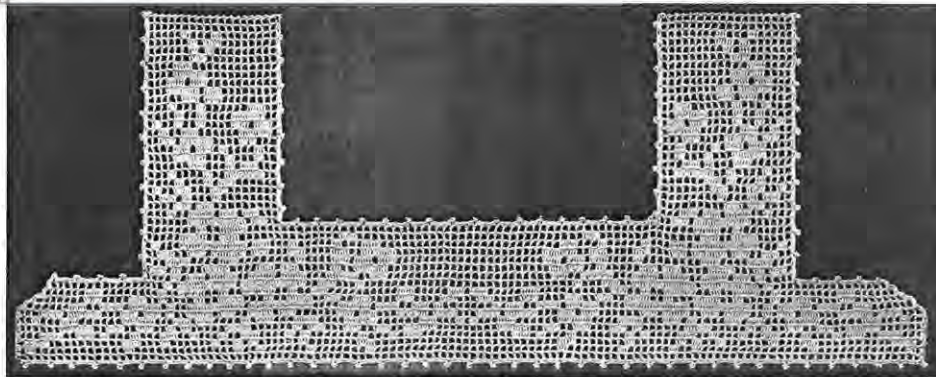


Fig. 4. **Yoke for Misses**  Art. 1151. No. 40.

MAKE a long ch. On the ch make 120 sp. If a larger yoke is desired, increase number of sp by separating the design in center of front. Continue following illustration. When one side is finished over shoulder break thread

and join to corresponding point on opposite side. Make back of yoke like front.

Cover Design  Art. 1151. Nos. 30, 40, 50.

CHAIN 6, join to form ring, ch 6, 1 tr (thread over needle twice) in ring, * ch 2, 1 tr in ring, ch 2, 1 tr in ring, repeat from * until there are 8 tr in ring, ch 2 and join in 4th ch of 1st 6 ch, ch 4, which counts for 1 tr, 4 tr in sp of 2 ch, ch 5, 4 tr in next sp, ch 5, 4 tr in next sp, ch 5, 4 tr in next sp, ch 2, 4 tr in next sp, ch 2, 4 tr in next sp, ch 2, 4 tr in next sp, ch 2, 4 tr in next sp, ch 2, join in 1st tr of gr; fasten off. This makes the point. Start another wheel. After 1st gr of 4 tr ch 2, 1 s c in 3d st of 5 ch, sp 1st wheel, ch 2,

4 tr in next sp, ch 2, 1 s c in next 5 ch loop, ch 2, 4 tr in next sp, ch 2, 4 tr in next sp, ch 2, 4 tr in next sp, ch 5, 4 tr in next sp, ch 5, 4 tr in next sp, ch 2, 4 tr in next sp, ch 2, join to 1st tr of gr. After the second row of yoke counting from the point, the wheels are made with 4 tr, 5 ch, 4 tr, 3 ch, 4 tr, 5 ch, 4 tr, 9 ch around wheel, except in the edges, when only a ch of 2 is made between gr.

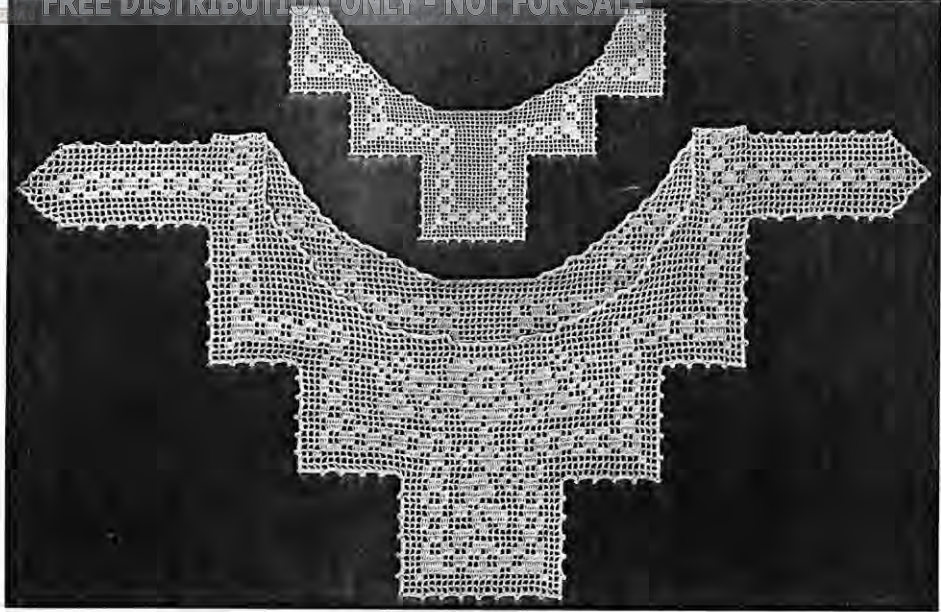

Yoke

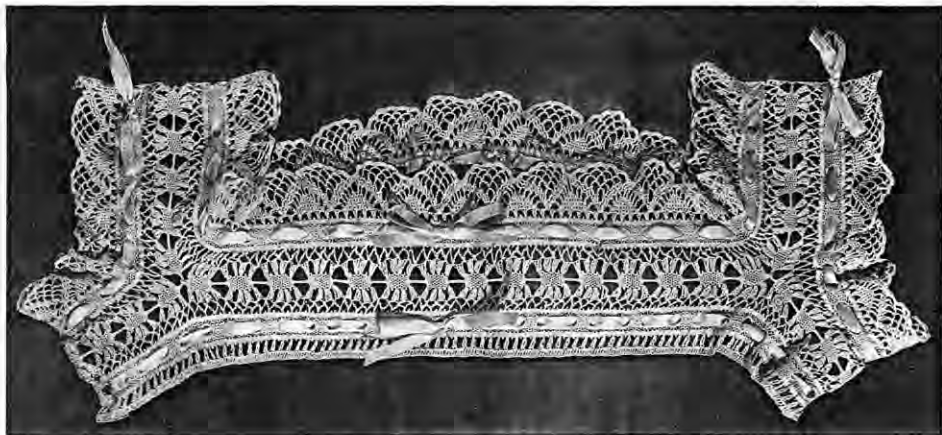

CHAIN 83, turn, 1 d c, in 8th ch for 1st sp.

1st row. 25 sp, ch 5 and continue following illustration. When 18th row is finished ch 48 st. Break thread.

Join thread to opposite side of front on ch 58 st; turn, 1 d c in 8th ch, which counts 1 sp; there should be 16 sp on the ch. Continue working, adding extra sp in the same way.



Yoke made of Fancy Braids

Make a CHAIN the length required to fit around yoke.

1st row. 1 tc in 4th ch from needle, 2 tc in next 4th ch, 2 tc in next 4th ch, and continue to end of ch, ch 1; turn.

2d row. * 11 sc in 1st 11 stitches, 5 ch, 2 tc in 2d sp, 1 ch, 2 tc in same sp, 3 ch, sk next sp, 11 sc in next 11 stitches, 5 ch, 2 tc in 2d sp, 1 ch, 2 tc in same sp, 3 ch, repeat from * to end of row. Be sure to have 11 sc at end of row, just the same as beginning. Ch 1; turn.

3d row. * sk 1st sc, 3 sc in next 3 sc, 3 ch, 1 tc in last of 3 ch of preceding row, 2 tc in y tc, 4 ch, 2 tc on 1 tc, 1 tc on 1st ch, 3 ch, sk 1st sc, 3 sc in next 3 sc, 3 ch, 1 tc in last of 3 ch of preceding row, 2 tc in 2 tc, 4 ch, 2 tc in next 2 tc, 1 tc in 1st ch, 3 ch, repeat from *, ch 1; turn.

4th row. * sk 1st sc, 7 sc in next 7 sc, 3 ch, 1 tc in last of 3 ch, 2 tc in next 2 tc, 5 ch, 1 sc in sp of 4 ch, 5 ch, 2 tc in last 2 tc, 1 tc in last of 3 ch, 3 ch, repeat from *, ch 1; turn.

5th row. * sk 1st sc, 5 sc in next 5 sc, 3 ch, 1 tc in last of 3 ch, 2 tc in 1 tc, 5 ch, 1 sc in sp of 5 ch, 5 ch, 1 sc in next sp, 5 ch, 2 tc in last 2 tc, 1 tc in last of 3 ch, 3 ch, repeat from *, ch 1; turn.

6th row. * sk 1st sc, 3 sc in next 3 sc, 3 ch, 1 tc in last of 3 ch, 2 tc in first 2 tc, 5 ch, 1 sc in last sp of 5 ch, 5 ch, 1 sc in next sp, 5 ch, 1 sc in next sp, 5 ch, 2 tc in last 2 tc, 1 tc in last of 3 ch, ch 3, repeat from *, ch 3; turn.

7th row. * 1 tc in last of 3 ch, 2 tc in last 2 tc, 5 ch, 1 sc in sp of 5 ch, 5 ch, 1 sc in next sp, 5 ch, 1 sc in next sp, 5 ch, 1 sc in next sp, 5 ch, 2 tc in last 2 tc, 1 tc in last of 3 ch, 1 tc in last of next 3 ch, 2 tc in next 2 tc, repeat from *, ch 1; turn.

8th row. * 3 sc in each sp of 5 ch, 2 sc in last 2 tc, sk next 2 tc, 2 sc in next 2 tc, repeat from *. Sew to top of yoke and sleeves.

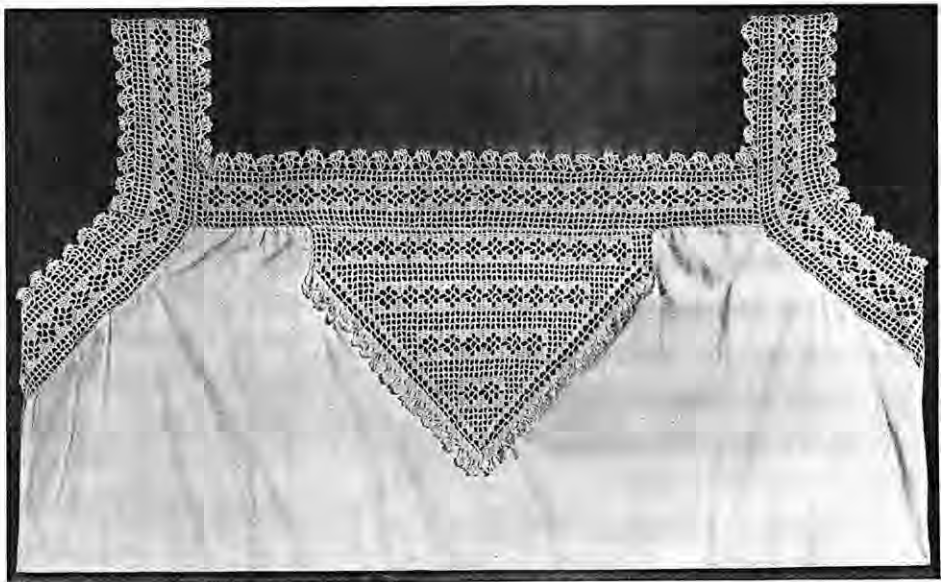


Fig. 8. Yoke  Art. 1151. No. 30 or 40.

CHAIN 38, turn, 1 d c, in 8th st, which makes 1 sp.

1st row. 10 sp, ch 5; turn.

2d row. 2 sp, 7 d c, 1 sp, 7 d c, 3 sp, ch 5; turn.

3d row. 2 sp, 7 d c, 1 sp, 7 d c, 3 sp, ch 5; turn.

4th row. 2 sp, 2 d c, ch 5, 1 s c in next sp, ch 5, 1 s c in next sp, ch 5, 2 d c in last 2 d c, 3 sp, ch 5; turn.

5th row. 3 sp, 4 d c, ch 5, 1 s c in next sp, ch 5, 4 d c, 2 sp, ch 5; turn.

6th row. 2 sp, 7 d c, 1 sp, 7 d c, 3 sp, ch 5; turn. Repeat.

Nightdress Yoke

Art. 316. No. 200.

MAKE clover leaf of 3 d s, p, 1 d s, p, 1 d s, p, repeat until there are 7 p, 5 d s, close ring. Make 2 more rings, joining first p to last. With second thread make ch of 9 d s. Make another clover leaf like first, ch of 9 d s, another clover leaf, joining as shown in illustration.

The four-leaf figure is made with same count as clover leaf, joining center of ring to insertion and joining figures together. Tie off. Make another row of insertion, joining to the row of four-leaf figures. Finish with narrow edge as shown.

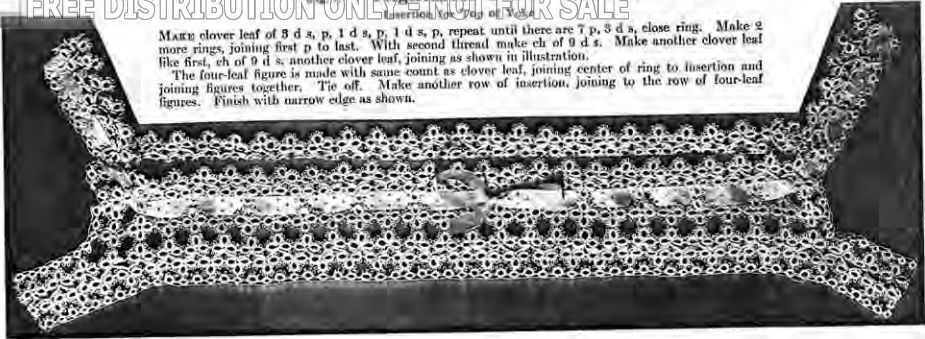
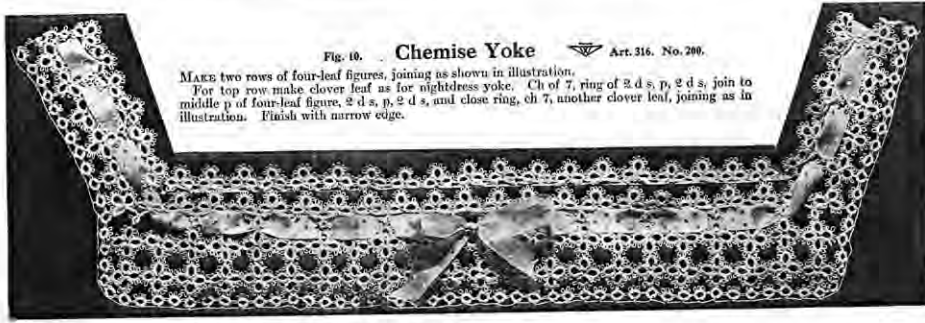


Fig. 10. Chemise Yoke

MAKE two rows of four-leaf figures, joining as shown in illustration.

For top row make clover leaf as for nightdress yoke. Ch of 7, ring of 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join to middle p of four-leaf figure, 2 d s, p, 2 d s, and close ring, ch 7, another clover leaf, joining as in illustration. Finish with narrow edge.



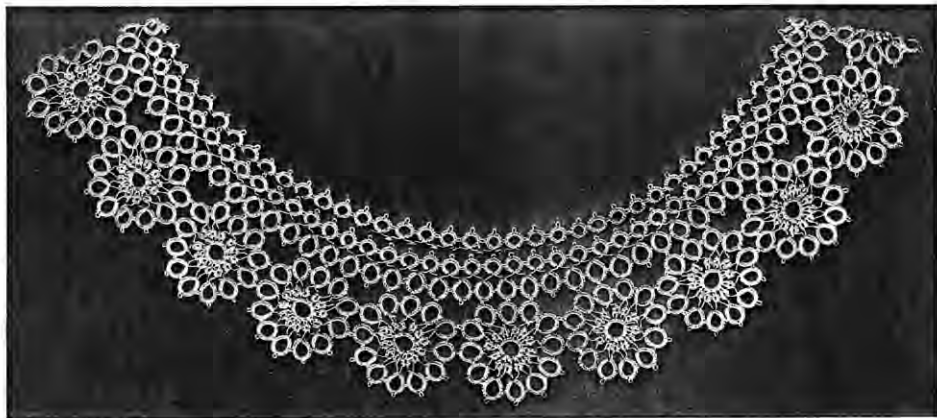



Fig. 11. Wheel Pattern for Nightdress Yoke  Art. 1151. Nos. 5, 16.

MAKE ring of 6 d s, p, 6 d s, p, 6 d s, p, 6 d s, close; turn, leaving a short thread. Make ring of 3 d s, p, 3 d s, close ring. Turn; make large ring, joining 1st p to last p of previous ring. Continue making 12 of each large and small, joining last large ring to the first. After making 12th small ring

catch thread to p on inside. Make 2 d s, catch into next p, 2 d s, catch to next p, and continue until 12 p are caught, finish with 2 d s. Draw ring very close. Tie threads. Join wheels together as shown in illustration.

For the Top of Yoke

MAKE ring of 6 d s, p, 6 d s, join in top of wheel, 6 d s, p, 6 d s, close. Turn; leave short length of thread. Make ring 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close. Turn; make ring of 6 d s, joining to previous ring at side, 6 d s,

joining in top of wheel, 6 d s, p, 6 d s, close. Turn; leave short thread, make ring of 4 d s, join in p of last small ring, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close. Continue making an extra large and extra small ring between wheels.

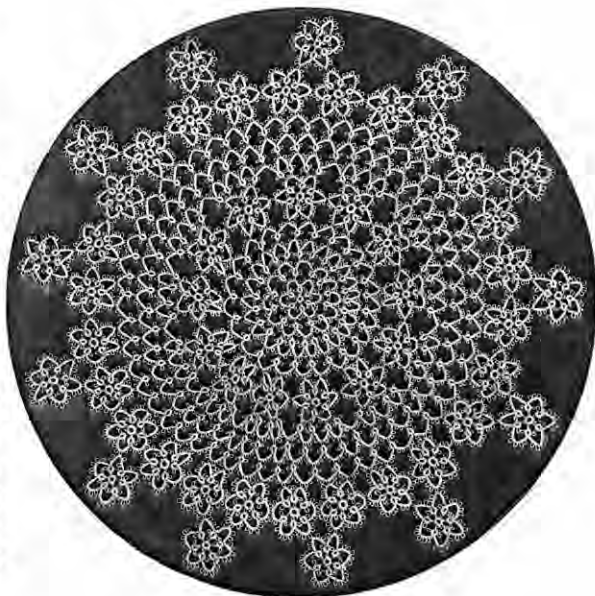


Fig. 12. Handkerchief Art. 316. No. 207.

1st row. r 4 d s, 3 p between 4 d s, close; turn, leave a short thread, r 4 d s, 3 p between 4 d s, close; turn, leave same length of thread, r 4 d s, join in last p of first r, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close; repeat until you have enough for handkerchief.
2d row. r 4 d s, 3 p between 4 d s, close, leave short thread; turn, 4 d s, join in top p of first row, 4 d s; turn, leave same length of thread, 4 d s, join in 3 p of first r, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close; repeat until around handkerchief.

1st row. r 2 d s, 6 p, 2 d s, close, tie, and break thread. r 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join in p of first r, 2 d s, p, 2 d s, close; turn, ch, 2 d s, 5 p, 2 d s between, r 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join in next p of first r until you have 6 small rings.
2d row. 2 threads. r 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join in 2 p of ch, 2 d s, p, 2 d s; turn, ch, 2 d s, 5 p between 2 d s; turn, r 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join in 4 p of same ch, 2 d s, p, 2 d s, close; repeat until around circle.
3d row. 2 threads. r 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join in 3 p of ch, 2 d s, p, 2 d s; turn, ch, 2 d s, 5 p between 2 d s; repeat until around circle.
4th row. Same as third row.
5th row. Medallions. r 2 d s, 6 p between 2 d s, close, tie, and break thread. r 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join in p of r, 2 d s, p, 2 d s, close; turn, ch, 4 d s, 5 p, 2 d s between, 4 d s; turn, r 2 d s, p, 2 d s, join in next p, 2 d s, p, 2 d s, close. In next ch, join third p to third p in ch on row five and repeat until around medallion. Repeat until you have enough medallions to go around circle. Join medallions together.
6th row. Is same as fourth row, only join to the medallion. Seventh row is the same as sixth row, only join in ch once. Eighth row is the same as the seventh row. Ninth row is the medallion, the same as the fifth row.
10th row. Is the medallion joined in every other medallion.

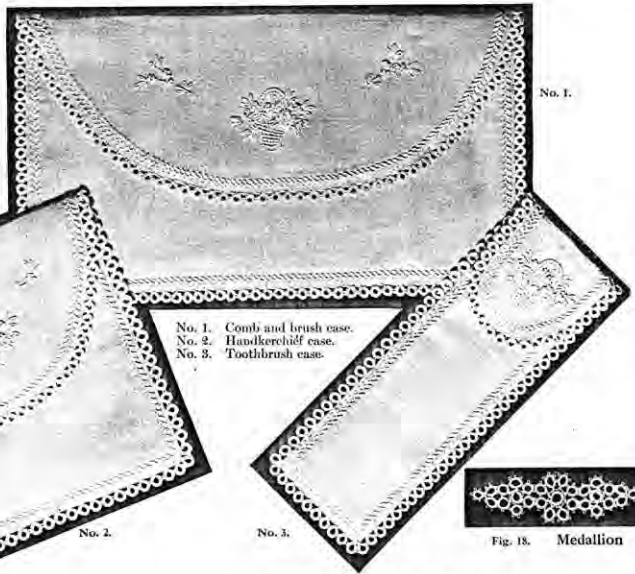

Directions for Cushion Top

For the top cut a piece of linen 6½ in. in diameter. Another circle 6 in. for the bottom, put a narrow hem in each piece. In top cut fourteen eyelets—or buttonholes—½ in. from edge. The eyelets in bottom piece are cut close to hem.

For tatting use Art. 316, No. 224. Make a ring containing 3 picots (p), 2 double stitches (d s) between each one; draw up. Another ring, 3 d s, join to first p on first ring made. Make 4 p, with 3 d s between each, 3 d s; draw up. Another ring 3 d s, join to last p on last ring, make 2 p with 3 d s between each, 3 d s; draw up. Tie thread under clover leaf to keep it firm. Turn work, leave thread ½ in., make another ring 6 d s, 1 p, 6 d s; draw up. Another ring, the same as the last one, turn work, leaving ½ in. of thread. Another ring 3 d s, 1 p, 3 d s, join to clover leaf, 3 d s, 1 p, 3 d s, and draw up. Another ring 3 d s, join to last p in preceding ring, 4 p, 3 d s between each, 3 d s; draw up. Another ring 3 d s, join to last p in last ring, 2 p, 3 d s between each, 3 d s; draw up and tie. Leave ½ in. of thread. Make ring 6 d s, join to p in second small ring, 6 d s; draw up. This completes the pattern.

- No. 2. Handkerchief case.
- No. 3. Toothbrush case.

The set as shown is made of pink linen. The embroidery worked in French knots and the lazy daisy stitch, using Art. 5141 embroidery cotton D. The tatting is made of Art. 316 tatting cotton No. 200.

Collar




Art. 1151. No. 20 or 30.

1st row. r 4 d s, 5 p between 4 d s, close; turn, leave 8 thread, r 4 d s, 2 p between 4 d s, close; turn, leave same length of thread, r 4 d s, join in last p of first r , 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close. Repeat until you have 84 double 4.
 2d row. 8 threads, ch, r d s, 2 p, 2 d s between, 4 d s, join in second r , ch, 4 d s, 2 p, 2 d s between, 4 d s, join in every 4th r until second.
 3d row. Start at 2 p in first ch, ch, 4 d s, 2 p, 2 d s between, 4 d s, join in 2 p. Continue until you get to 2d p in last ch.
 4th row. Start at 2 p in second ch, stop as second.
 5th row. Start at 2 p in second ch of third row.
 6th row. Start at 2 p in second ch of fourth row.
 7th row. Start at 2 p in third ch of seventh row.
 8th row. Start at 2 p in fourth ch of eighth row.

r 4 d s, 2 p between 4 d s, close; turn, leave thread, r 4 d s, 2 p between 4 d s, close; leave same length of thread, r 4 d s, join in last p of first r , 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close. Repeat until you have enough to go around and join on by running a thread through the mesh-lines.
 r d s, 12 p between 2 d s, close; leave a short thread, r 4 d s, 2 p between 4 d s, close; turn, leave a shorter thread, 4 d s, join in the first p of center; 4 d s, close. Repeat until there are 12 r of each size, the smaller joined to the center r , the larger joined together.
 4 d s, joined in last p of medallion, 4 d s, turn, ch, 4 d s, 2 p, 4 d s; turn and repeat until you have 8 small r joined to the medallion, ch, 4 d s, 2 p, 4 d s; turn, r d s, 2 p, 2 d s, join in 2 p of medallion; 2 d s, 2 p, 2 d s, close, ch, 4 d s, r d s, 2 p, 2 d s, close, ch, 4 d s, r d s, r d s, 2 p, 2 d s, join to another medallion; 4 d s, 2 p, 2 d s, close, ch, 4 d s, 2 p, 4 d s; turn, r 4 d s, join in next r of second medallion. Continue as the first until you have 8 small r joined to the p. Join on a medallion at each end to 40 in.

For tatting,  Art. 316; for embroidery, Art. 1116.

MAKE ring of 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close ring. With second thread make chain of 5 d s, p, 5 d s, make ring of 4 d s; joining first p to last p of previous ring, continue ring as before, making length desired. Crochet chain at top to new one.

Insertion for Towel

Made with shuttle and ball.
 Ring of 4 d s, p, 5 d s, p, until you have 2 p, 4 d s; close. Tie on second thread. Turn, and with shuttle and ball, 4 d s, then make another ring as before. Turn. Use ball and shuttle, r 4 d s, join to first p on ring opposite 3 d s, p, until there are 5 p, 4 d s; close and tie. Turn and use shuttle and ball again.

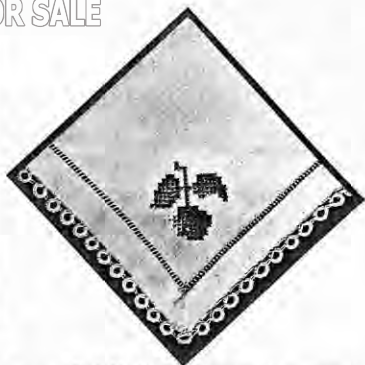


Fig. 21. Fruit Napkin with cross stitch embroidery

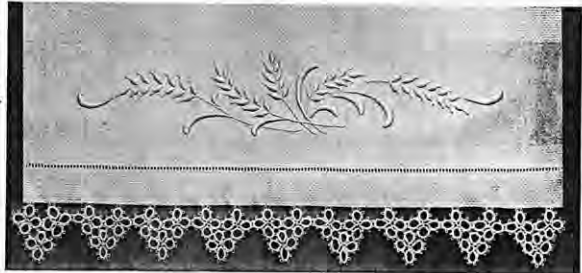


Fig. 23. Guest Towel. For tatting,  Art. 316; for embroidery, Art. 199B

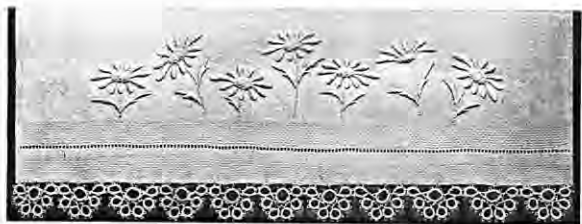


Fig. 26. Edging for Towel For Tatting, Art. 316. Shade No. 200. Embroidery, Art. 199B.
 Make ring of 3 d s, 9 p, with 3 d s between. Close. Turn. r of 4 d s, 8 p, with 3 d s between, 4 d s, close. Join to second p another like first, joining first p to last, join to first p of outer ring. Continue, making six rings as shown in illustration.

Make ring of 4 d s (open), 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close ring. Commence second ring close to first ring. 4 d s, join to last p, 3 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close ring. Make third ring close to second, 4 d s, join to last p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close ring. Make center of clover leaf. Carry thread to last p made and tie there. Leave three-quarters inch of thread in starting next ring. 4 d s, tie on thread instead of join to middle p of last ring, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close. Repeat from."

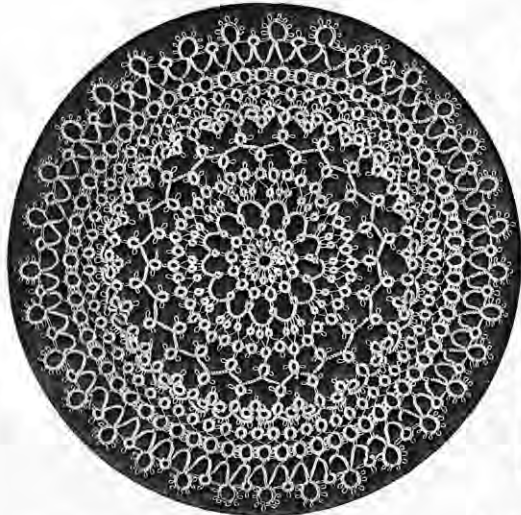


Fig. 28. **D'Oyley** Art. 1151. No. 39.

11 4 d s, 13 p, 2 d s between, close. Leave a short thread, r 4 d s, 3 p, 4 d s between, close; turn. Leave a shorter thread, 4 d s, join in first p of center 4 d s, close. Repeat until there are 13 r of each side, the smaller joined to the center r, the larger joined together.

2d row. 2 threads. 4 d s, join in top of circle, 4 d s, close. ch 4 d s, 3 p with 1 d s between, 4 d s, r 4 d s, join next p, 4 d s. Repeat until around circle.

3d row. r 4 d s, 2 p, 4 d s between, close. Leave short thread, 4 d s, join in first p of last ch around circle, 4 d s; turn. 4 d s, join in last p of 1st ring, 4 d s, 2 p between 4 d s, close. Continue until around circle.

4th row. 2 threads. 4 d s, p, 4 d s, join in last ring of circle, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close; turn. ch 6 d s; turn. r 4 d s, 3 p between 4 d s; close. ch 6 d s; turn. r 4 d s, p, 4 d s, join in 3d r of circle, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close. Repeat until around circle.

5th row. 2 threads. r 4 d s, p, 4 d s, join in r of circle, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close; turn. ch 3 d s, 4 d s between, 4 d s, turn. ch 2 d s, close leaf, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, join in last p of r, 4 d s,

p, 4 d s, close. 4 d s, join in last p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close. r 4 d s, join in last p of 2d r, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close. ch 3 d s, 3 p, 2 d s between, 3 d s, r 4 d s, p, 4 d s, join in top p of r around circle. Repeat until around circle.

1st row is for heading. r 4 d s, p, 4 d s, join to 2d p of ch around circle, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close; turn. Leave a short thread, r 7 p, 4 d s between; turn. Leave same length of thread, r 4 d s, join in last p of the small ring. 4 d s, join in 3d p of circle, 4 d s, p, 4 d s, close; turn. r 7 p, 4 d s between, join first 3 p to the last three of the larger r. Repeat all around circle.

Last row. 2 threads. ch, 8 d s, join in top p of circle, 3 d s; turn. r 4 d s, 3 p between 4 d s, close. ch 8 d s, join in top p, 8 d s; turn. r 4 d s, 8 p between, join last p to small r, 4 d s, close, repeat until around circle.

Use directions as given in Fig. 20, having 3 p on ring.
